A cultured person who introduced life in the heavy snowfall areas Bokushi Suzuki

Bokushi Suzuki, a prominent researcher of snow, folklore, and literature, was born in 1770. His merchant family ran a cotton crepe brokerage and a pawnshop in Shiozawa. He showed his talents in studying art and literature since he was a little child. Even after he took over his family business, he continued to study haiku (Japanese poems of seventeen syllables), painting, and calligraphy. He established friendly relations with renowned cultured people such as Bakin Takizawa, Ikku Jippensha, and Danjuro Ishikawa. He decided to publish a book introducing the customs of the Echigo region with heavy snow in 1795. It took him 40 years to complete the book, titled as "Hokuetsu-setsufu". His book was a best seller in Edo. He also published "Akiyama-kiko", introducing the customs and landscapes of the Akiyama region, which was not yet widely known, with pictures and compositions. The book enjoyed a favorable reception. His books have been valued highly also as a



An artist who devoted himself to carving Yoshio Iguchi

Carver Yoshio Iguchi created many works of art living in Tokyo in the transition period between the beginning of the Showa era and the beginning of World War II. He was born in Urasa in Minamiuonuma County. As a little boy, he was fascinated by carvings in the main hall of Fuko temple created by Jingoro Hidari and Ganji Kitagawa, who was a renowned local carver. When he was a primary school student, he already handled knives and chisels skillfully, working exquisitely on pieces of wood, bamboo, desks, and more, surprising the people around him. He studied the arts by farmers and the liberal painting movement at Hakkai Liberal University, which later led him to change his art style completely. He came to Tokyo in 1926, when he was 25 years old, to study under Masahiro Sawada. Three years later, his work was selected for the 9th Teiten Exhibition. Since then, his works were selected for many exhibitions and honors. He created a number of statues of Buddha and the gods. It was a pity that he passed away suddenly when he was only 48 years old. Among his works, the seated statue of Bokushi Suzuki situated in Bokushi Suzuki Memorial Hall is well-known as people feel attached to it. (See photo at the top left of this page.)

A Great Commander in the Sengoku era, who was both a good warrior and a good scholar

Kagekatsu Uesugi was born as the second son of Masakage Nagao and was adopted by Kenshin Uesugi. After Kenshin's death, Kagekatsu defeated Kagetora, who was also an adopted son of Kenshin, in the Otate War and became the head of the Uesugi family. Being appointed as one of the five great stewards by Hideyoshi Toyotomi, Kagekatsu ruled the fief of Aizu, which yielded 1.2 million koku of rice. However, Kagekatsu allied with Mitsunari Ishida in the Sekigahara War and lost. As a result, his fief was transferred to Yonezawa, which yielded 0.3 million koku of rice.

Kanetsugu Naoe, who was born in the Higuchi family in Ueda-so in Uonuma County, was appointed by Kagekatsu Uesugi to become the head of the renowned Naoe family, a senior vassal family of the Uesugi family. Kanetsugu also became a regent of the Kagekatsu regime and in charge of all domestic administration and diplomacy. He ruled the fief of Echigo, which yielded about 50 thousand koku of rice. When Kagekatsu Uesugi was transferred to Aizu, Hideyoshi Toyotomi appointed Kanetsugu to rule the fief of Yonezawa, which yielded 0.3 million koku of rice. It is recorded that Kanetsugu received the same treatment as feudal lords enjoyed.

The father of the Joetsu railway Mitsugi Okamura

Mitsugi Okamura was born in 1836. His father was the mayor of the village of Shimohitokaichi. His family ran a sake brewery and a pawnshop. Okamura devoted his life to establishing primary schools, hospitals, and financial institutions, repairing roads, and maintaining river ways as a chief of a ward and a county during the series of reforms in the Meiji Restoration. Above all, the construction of the Joetsu railway was his lifework. He became a member of the House of Representatives and proposed the construction of the Joetsu railway. However, his proposal was turned down. Then, he himself established the Joetsu railway corporation instead. However, after the Sino-Japanese War, prices soared. He had to break up his company before achieving his goal. Later, his efforts and those who followed in his footsteps made the government decide to nationalize the Joetsu railway. Okamura died in 1922 before seeing the entire Joetsu railway opened to traffic.
